Thank-you Nobles, for taking the time and putting the effort into helping these many communities celebrate their Centennial and putting Wa Wa Shrine in the forefront.

Since my last message to you we have been very busy with our Circuses and Ceremonial activities. Again, thanks to all of you, our Circuses were a tremendous success. Our Provincial Chairman, Noble Bill Forrest, reported at our Wa Wa Ceremonial that the Circus netted over \$111,000 for Wa Wa Shrine this year. This was a huge success and the credit goes to all the hardworking Nobles and their Ladies, who gave of their time and effort to make the Circus such a success this year. We have not seen this amount of revenue for many, many years and it will certainly benefit our many Shrine activities.

At the end of May, the Regina Shrine Club and our Hospital Chairman, Ill Sir Ken McInnis and

their special committee organized and held a very successful Patient Appreciation Night in Regina. We heard from several of our patients and their families on their experiences within the Shrine Hospital system. We were also pleased to have Dr. Ken Guidera, Chief of Staff, Twin Cities Shrine Hospital, and one of his team members attended and give a presentation from their side of the Shrine Hospital system. The evening was very enjoyable and memorable for all in attendance. It gave all of us a tug of the heart, to know we care and meaning to our involvement as Shriners.

Our Wa Wa Ceremonial was very successful and again I want to thank all the Nobles and their Ladies who helped make this such a success. We had gorgeous weather and a huge turnout for all the various Ceremonial activities. For the first time since 1996, the First and Third Sections were opened to our Ladies and guests, and everyone truly enjoyed the pageantry of the Ceremonial. We had 28 new Candidates join our fraternity and we welcome them and their Ladies to Wa Wa Shrine. I would encourage them to get involved with their Clubs and Units, to enjoy what the Shrine has to offer. We also had twenty-nine of our Shrine units participating in this years Parade. The citizens of Yorkton certainly enjoyed the show put on by our Shriners.

In July, your representatives attended the Imperial Session in Baltimore, Md. It was a very important business session as it concerned the relocation of our Canadian Hospital, as our present hospital is beyond its capacity and needs replacing. Over the past two years there have been ongoing discussions to relocate the Canadian Shrine Hospital to Ottawa, London or build new within Montreal, in order to meet the future needs of our patients. The Special Study Committee put forth a motion that the Canadian Hospital be relocated to London, Ontario.

In order for this motion to pass, it required 75% of the voting membership in favour of the motion. After many good presentations for and against the motion, the balloting was held. The motion was defeated with only about 49% of the membership in favour of the motion. Work has begun on the new

proposed hospital area, however it will be several years before the hospital will be ready for occupancy.

Later in July, the Carrot River Valley Shrine Club hosted the Provincial Wa Wa Shrine Golf Tournament in Melfort, Sask. It was unfortunate that the turnout was not up to par, however with the many parades and provincial Centennial activities being held, those that attended enjoyed themselves very much. I congratulate the wet winners on a rain-shortened tournament. The Carrot River Valley Shrine Club is to be commended for their efforts in organizing and hosting this major Wa Wa Shrine event. Thank-You.

This month we are looking forward to attending Midwest Shrine Association summer session in Rapid City, S.D. There will be several of our units attending and performing and the M.S.A. promises to be a good ending to our summer activities. Our own Wa Wa Shrine M.S.A. executive will be in attendance to make final arrangements in our hosting of the Midwest Shrine Association winter business and summer parade/competitions next year in Regina. It is hoped that each one of our Shrine Clubs and their Units help wherever possible in making M.S.A. 2006 the best ever.

This fall your Divan and I have a full schedule in presenting further programs to all Nobles. We are making plans for a Mini-Ceremonial, Membership Seminar, Servers Course and Shrine Club visitations. Stay tuned for further details. We are also developing several new policies for the administration of Wa Wa Shrine on your behalf.

Before closing, I would like to ask all Nobles or Masons, that if you know of an individual that would make a good Shriner for our organization, please bring that person or his name forth, to your Membership Committee for appropriate processing.

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

Recorder's Report



It has been a very busy Summer for our Shrine Clubs and Units. During this Centennial year, there have been many extra parades for our Units to attend. We're having a great time.

Our ceremonial in Yorkton in June was a great success and we welcome the twenty six new Nobles to our organization. A Mini-Ceremonial will be held in Regina on November 5, 2005 to accommodate Applicants that were not able to make it last June. There are Masons receiving Third Degrees in September and October in a number of Lodges so let's get the Petitions completed and to the Shrine Centre Office as soon as you can so that we can include them in the Mini-Ceremonial.

The Membership stands at 1,229 as of July 31, 2005 and as of that date, 334 members have not paid their dues for 2005. Forty eight of those have not paid for two years and are in jeopardy of being

suspended at the end of the year.

Nobles, this represents a \$25,050.00 short fall and puts Wa Wa Shriners in a difficult position. Annual dues pay for temple operations throughout our jurisdiction and for Shriners to enjoy our organization every dollar is vital.

Additionally, other than deaths, suspensions are our single most serious loss of members. Every suspension is examined by the Membership Committee for the reason it happened and efforts are made to have the Noble re-consider.

If you are delinquent in paying your dues, please correct the situation as soon as you can.

Financial difficulties are sometimes a problem but that should not mean you can't be a Shriner. Please contact me as we can help.

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Commemorative Lapel Pin

The Imperial Shrine Membership Committee recently announced that each new member, restored member and top line signer will receive Lapel Pin signifying his participation in the Imperial Shrine Membership Year from June 1st, 2005 concluding June 10th, 2006. In addition, the temples achieving the highest percentage of net gain in membership during 2005 will have an opportunity to have an Imperial Divan member attend their International Shrine Membership Year event in 2006. June 10th, 2006 is the date selected to celebrate the 130th Anniversary of the founding of the Imperial Council of the Shrine North America. Our June 2006 ceremonial is scheduled for June 9th and 10th, 2006.

To celebrate the Imperial Council's 130th Anniversary, the goal for all 191 temples is to bring into shrinedom a total 15,000 new Shriners and restore 5,000 members during the Imperial Shrine Membership Year. Wa Wa Temple, based on our Jan. 1st, 2005 membership of 1222, has been challenged to create 42 new Shriners and restore 14

members. Can we meet or surpass this challenge? YES WE CAN because of the dedication towards and enthusiasm each Noble has for membership. On Aug. 1st, 2005, our membership was 1229 as the result of 26 new Shriners, at our June 2005 Ceremonial, 10 members restored, three demits issued and 25 deaths having occurred (Total of 41 death in 2004). To meet the Imperial Shrine Membership Challenge and our temple's objective of a 1% minimum increase in membership, at least 31 new Shriners and four restored members are required. Why Stop at these accomplishments as for the past 10 years, there has been an average loss of 48 new Shriners during the ceremonials of Nov. 5th, 2005 and June 9th and 10th, 2006, both to be held in Regina. Nothing bars you from asking a Mason to become a Shriner. Yes, in this Masonic Jurisdiction, you can solicit a man to become a Mason as it has been stated: (By Grand Lodge of Saskatchewan) "If you have a friend, relative or companion whom you think would make a good Mason and a good member of your lodge, it would

be proper to invite such a man to discuss an application in masonry."



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CALLING ALL NOBLES

International Shrine Membership Year



The new International Shrine Membership Year will begin on June 1, 2005 and conclude on June 10, 2006. During that year, all Nobles are encouraged to recruit as many new Nobles as possible, as well as more than 100 already Shriner.

The Imperial Membership Executive Committee recently discussed the future of the previously held International Shrine Membership Day - June 10, 2006. After much debate, it was decided that the event would become the International Shrine Membership Year, and will shift the focus to the entire year leading up to that day.

All 191 Temples will be asked to have a special event or celebration on or before June 10, 2006 to commemorate the 120th Anniversary of the founding of the Imperial Council of the Shrine of North America. The goal is to bring in 15,000 new Shriners and restore 5,000 members during that time as well.

"We are looking to each and every Shriner to make the International Shrine Membership Year a success," said Imperial Membership Chairman Kyle Thomas. "If all Nobles make it a personal commitment, we will be successful in our endeavors."

Each Temple has been assigned a specific quota to help reach the goal of 20,000. The Membership Development office in Tampa will provide Temples with a supply of special posters to help keep track of goals. In addition, every new member initiated, every member restored and every top-line signer between June 1, 2005 and June 10, 2006 will receive a special lapel pin to signify his contribution to the event.

The Temples achieving the highest percentage of net gain in membership during 2006 will have an opportunity to have an Imperial Officer member attend their International Shrine Membership Year event in 2006.

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Gary W. Dunwoody elected Imperial Potentate at the 131st Imperial Council Session



During the 2008 Imperial Council Session held at the Biltmore Hotel July 3-7, Gary W. Dunwoody of Dunwoody, Ark. was elected Imperial Potentate of the Fraternity of North America making him the highest ranking stranger in the world. A champion Potentate, he will be serving his 11th term in the Fraternity of Leaders for both the Shrine of North America and Shrines International. He previously served as a member of the hospital systems board of Tennessee in 1980 to 1981.

As Potentate of Shrine International in 1980 and 1981, one of the world's oldest Shrine Associations in 1990, Dunwoody has been active in the Fraternity since he first became a member in 1976.

Dunwoody is proud of his Masonic heritage. His father, Earl Dunwoody, received his 50-year Masonic anniversary pin as his 40th birthday gift. He was one of seven when Dunwoody was raised a Master Mason at Big Rock Lodge #644 in 1942. Dunwoody is a member of The York Rite and Scottish Rite Bodies and is honored to have his 134th Degree from The Scottish Rite Masons. He received the request of the Governor to give a letter of commendation from the Order of DeMolay. Dunwoody responded by being awarded Membership Award Shrine in Atlanta, Ga. and Membership Shrine in Jackson, Ark.

He was born in Rome, Ga. and then moved to

Burrellton, Pa. where he grew up working at his parents' seafood restaurant. He was on the football team and received the national high school football scholarship to earn a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Lockport College in Lockport, Ga. and is a member of the Kappa Sigma Fraternity.

Dunwoody recently served his community chapter of Emerald Supply and Little Rock and now works as a general manager for the newly formed company, Capital Supply, where he has a position in Dallas, Texas. Active in community events, Dunwoody is a past member of the board of directors of Little Rock Rotary Club and in 1993 was chosen and elected chairman of a group named as Little Rock's 100th Anniversary celebration at the board of directors of the City of Little Rock. He is a Past Grand Master and a member of the Little Rock Regional Chamber of Commerce having served on its governing body and a committee.

Dunwoody and his wife, Wanda, attend St. Luke's Episcopal Church where he has served for many years as a member of its vestry. They have four daughters and six grandchildren.

She won together perfectly. One of the primary goals of telemedicine is to bring Shriners Hospital's unique comprehensive care to more children, especially those who are far away from our hospitals.

The First Lady's slogan was originally used by Carlton Owen, M.D., during his year as President of the Kenta Shrine Center in Lexington, Maine. The phrase was coined by his daughter, who was a very creative artist and always interested in the work of Shriners. The retired surgeon said he is happy to share her words if it will be a praise money for Shriners Hospitals.

For Imperial Paramount Gary W. Darnovsky, helping children is the heart of the Shrine fraternity. "Gary has always felt strongly about the children supporting the hospitals, and so I wanted a project that would reflect his passion for 'both' and 'one'," said First Lady Wanda. "It's an honor and a privilege to support Gary and his love of both the

activity and the hospital's telemedicine as a cost-effective, efficient way to deliver services where our patients need them, example expenses, patients' out-of-pocket charges, and patients' absences from their jobs.

Sometimes for a child to have just aches and pains have the right practices all but total his or her life. Telemedicine improves some of that burden, said First Lady Wanda.

Telemedicine, or teleradiology, is used at our hospitals and other pediatric hospitals to provide screening, follow-up and follow-up information for patients. Using telemedicine may reduce costs, reduce patient transportation costs, for

example, in 2004, the Hasbrouck Hospital treated 110 patients via telemedicine, and saved Alpha Shriners \$130,000 in transportation costs alone. Similarly, the Tampa hospital's affiliated "Emples" saved \$70,000.

Several Shriners Hospitals have telemedicine programs in place. "It is our intent that all our hospitals have video-conferencing capabilities in place by the end of 2006," said Peter Armstrong, M.D., Medical Affairs Director for Shriners Hospitals for Children.

While telemedicine clinics, like outreach clinics, are a hospital responsibility, more use of them benefits everyone involved. First Lady Wanda's program will be administered as a grant program through the hospitals, coordinated and approved by the Telemedicine Governance Council.

As Imperial Sir Gary and First Lady Wanda make their visits throughout this Imperial Year, they ask that, instead of personal gifts, Nobles and Ladies, each use a "Healing the World One Child at a Time" certificate. A specially designed pin or tie will be given for each certificate purchased.

Certificates can be given to the Darnovskys, or may be sent with donations to Shriners International Headquarters, Donor Relations Department, P.O. Box 301761, Tampa, FL 33631. Daughters of the Nile

Recently a question was asked "What do you do as Daughters of the Nile"? We are part of the Masonic Fraternal Family. As Daughters of the Nile in Canada, and the United States of America, we work together to assist the Shriners with their parents in the 22 Shriners Hospitals for Children. As a result of our collective efforts, there is a plaque representing one million dollars in every Shriners Hospital for Children, recognizing our monetary contributions. Most have a marker representing a second million in contributions. Since the founding of the Daughters of the Nile in 1914, \$39,442,424.00 has been donated to the Shriners hospitals.

The Supreme Temple Daughters of the Nile has a program of giving entitled "My Gift". This program has two funds, the Convalescent Endowment Fund (C.E.F.) and the Convalescent Relief Fund (C.R.F.). The C.E.F. is invested and only the interest is spent. The C.R.F. is spent as received.

In 1999, the Canadian Trust was formed. All charitable funds contributed in Canada remain in Canada and are spent in Canada. The Canadian Trust is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act of Canada. In 2003, the latest year of record so

far, \$916,387.19 has been contributed in Canada to the outpatients, arthotics, braces, shoes, etc.

In addition, many Temples sew garments, quilts, pillows, toys, and have parties for the children while in hospital, as well as giving many volunteers hours for varied activities. In our own Temple, the Aurora Club that is located in the NorthWest area of the province, is our Sewing Club. This group works with great dedication, supplying the requests from the Montreal Unit. Over the years these hard working dedicated ladies have sent 5,284 articles valued at \$22,566.24 to the Montreal Unit. These ladies are ever watchful for bargains in crayons, books, new and used (rejuvenated and washed) toys, towels, fabric remnants, and personal care articles, such as those supplied in the hotels and motels. Each child receives a "hygiene bag" on admission containing personal care products. In addition, these members collect old pantyhose to be cut up for stuffing for the cushions used to support arms or legs after surgery. These cushions go home with the children. Each cushion is roughly the size of half a regular pillow (fatter, longer or thinner). It takes about 30 pantyhose chopped up into one-inch and two-inch pieces

to fill a pillow to the desired size. Last year 30 cushions were sent to Montreal.

All articles are shipped free of charge, the shipping costs being picked up by an anonymous local business man. Thank you to that generous person.

Since 1981 to the latest date (2004) on record, Daughters of the Nile, Anquet Temple #123 has contributed \$61,407.91 to the C.E.F., \$118,518.27 to the C.R.F., \$22,851.66 in value from the Aurora Club #3 to the Montreal Unit. In addition, Aurora Nile Club #3 has collected and sent 120,000 Campbell Soup labels this year. These labels are redeemed for school supplies for the hospitals in the U.S.A.

Daughters of the Nile have a program of receiving in amounts from \$10.00 to \$5,000.00 and up. The giver receives a small gift when a contribution is made.

Thank you to the Editor of the Warblings for requesting this information. We are privileged to be able to help the Shriners in this way, making a difference in the lives of the Shrine Children.

Appreciation Night A Great Success

On May 31st, 2005, the second appreciation night was held to recognize our hospital patients and to reinforce the importance of our philanthropy among the nobility. One hundred and fifty people attended this special function to hear reports from the four patients who attended and our two special guests, Dr. Ken Guidera, Chief Medical Officer, Twin Cities Shrine Hospital, in St. Paul, Minnesota and Mr. Rick Webber, Prosthesis Technician also from Twin Cities Hospital.

A patient report of particular interest was given by Ms. Stacey Gwilliam of Wolseley, Sask. It related to her daughter Rayanne's medical condition and treatment at the Montreal Hospital.

Rayanne was born on August 28, 1999 and was 12 weeks early. She weighed two pounds and seven

ounces and was 14 1/2 inches long. She spent 21 1/2 months in the Regina General Hospital N.I.C.U. and we were informed of some of the complications that could occur when a child is born so prematurely.

Rayanne was followed up with doctors, nutritionists, and therapists and when she was 21 1/2 years old, she was diagnosed with cerebral palsy and we were told that she would need a walker or canes to walk and may not be able to walk without walking aides. We continued with physiotherapy and then I

talked to Rayanne's physiotherapist asking if there was any other options I could explore and she told me about the Shriner's Children's Hospital in Montreal. She then introduced me to a lady from Moose Jaw who had already taken her daughter to Montreal for treatment. She was very informative and told me who I needed to get in touch with in our area and I got all of the forms filled out and then I received a letter stating Rayanne was accepted and her first appointment was in Montreal on November 12, 2004. Dr. Benaroch examined her and felt that she would benefit from botox injections in her legs so we returned to Montreal and Raymore had the injections done on December 3, 2004 and all of the staff were truly wonderful and made a not so pleasant procedure a lot less stressful.

On December 6, 2004, she had casts put on her legs to keep them straight and to help stretch out her muscles. We then came back home for about two weeks and then went back to Montreal again on December 19, 2004 for new casts and she was fitted for her new AFO braces. We then came home again and in the first week of January, we took the casts off and saw Rayanne stand with her heels down, which at one time was very hard and next to impossible for her to do and she now managed it with ease. It took her a little while to get used to walking with her heels down but within about two to three weeks she was able to walk short distances without any assistance.

We went back to Montreal for a follow up appointment on February 18, 2005 and Dr. Benaroch was very happy with Rayanne's range in

the muscles in her legs. We continued with physiotherapy and Rayanne's local physiotherapist is very pleased with her progress. On May 31, 2005, Rayanne and I went to the Patient Appreciation Night at the Shrine Center in Regina and met a lot

of wonderful people and everyone was happy to see how well Rayanne was walking which turned into running around. What a great accomplishment. I now have to tell her to slow down and take it easy. What a wonderful feeling!

We went to Montreal again on June 2, 2005 for another follow up and we go back for our sixth time on September 1, 2005 for more botox injections in September 2. Rayanne is still doing well from her last treatment, it actually lasted quite long but we don't want her muscles to get that tight again so we are going ahead with another treatment.

The opportunity to be able to get such excellent care for Rayanne is truly a blessing. The Shriners are a wonderful organization and we would truly like to thank each and every one for their dedication and compassion. Rayanne is so much more independent and really enjoys doing things for herself. She had had a lot of positive improvements and is doing better every day. So from the bottom of our hearts "Thank You" and "God Bless You All".




