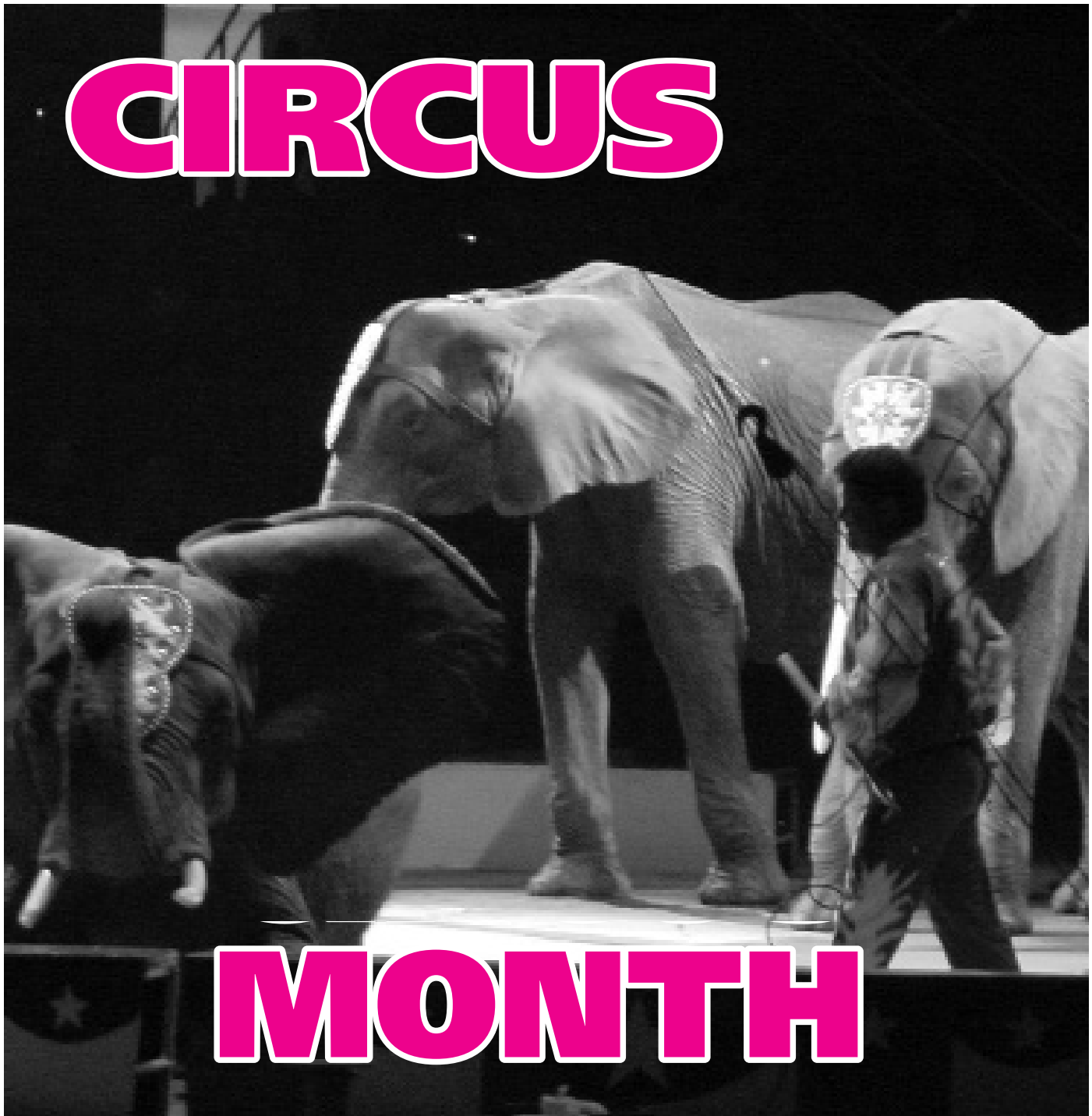

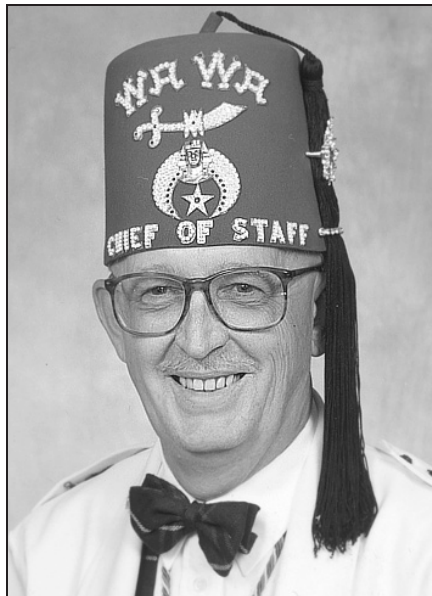

# Oriental Guide Report

## Oriental Guide Seminar Tampa Florida March 15-18, 2006

A four-day visit to the sunny side of Tampa during a March in Saskatchewan ... what's not to like!

Kidding aside this is a very valuable exercise for the well being of WaWa Shriners. I would recommend that for future OG's that if the Seminar begins on the 15th that they plan to arrive on the 14th. The main reason is that they plan tours of Headquarters and the Tampa Hospital during the day and transportation from Regina gets you into Tampa around the supper hour.

Each day of the Seminar began early and went through to the supper hour. The accommodation at the Marriott Airport Hotel is excellent and the lunches were of excellent quality especially as they were served on the Terrace Garden. You are responsible for breakfast and supper. The dress is shrine casual.

Attending these sessions are OG's, some Asst. Rabbans, presenters and Imperial Officers. We were broken into four groups and then moved through the various sessions. The sessions included: Colorado and Iowa Fund Raising, Budget and Finance, Temple Communications, Membership, "Stickballs to Star Wars", Shriners Hospitals and Donor Relations, Leadership Power Shop, Teamwork and Management, What's Not In The Book, and Shrine Law. This year an entire day was spent on Dr. John Maxwell's The 21 Irrefutable Laws of Leadership. This book/program/process is a "definitive statement of the timeless laws you simply must follow if you want to be a great leader ... This was the first time that this training was implemented. Our Assistant Rabban, Richard Brown, is receiving the same program this week. Next year, they plan to repeat the training for the next OG and AR, eventually covering all of the line. The day went for 10 hours but was one of the best seminars that I have attended. You must discard any notion that you

will choose to display leadership during "my year". The first law is the Law of the Lid which brings home the central message immediately.

Some notes from the Seminar are that two long-standing members of the Imperial office administration are retiring this year. Charlie Cumpstone Jr., Executive Vice President, retires after 44 years and Lewis K. Molnar, Executive Vice-President, retires after 40 years. Cumpstone will be replaced by 25-year employee Mike Andrews and Molnar will be replaced by a new employee. Taking Mike Andrews' place in Public Relations will be Alicia Argiz-Lyons who has been working in that department. Also noted is the radical enhancement of the current headquarters' website. The site will become easier to use and will allow for a more fluid updating process.

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# Shriners Hospitals for Children

## 2005 Facts & Figures

**F**or over 100 years, Shriners Hospitals for Children has provided expert, non-profit medical care to more than 900,000 children with orthopaedic problems, such as limb deformities, and the Shriners of North America in 33 different countries operates 34 Shriners Hospitals for Children in 22 hospitals located in 18 states, as well as in Canada and Mexico.

The orthopaedic Shriners Hospitals are dedicated to providing specialized medical and non-profit services to all children, regardless of race, ethnicity, religious beliefs, or disability. Patients and families of the Shriners of North America in 33 different countries include children with deformities and limb deficiencies, scoliosis, treatment of the sickle cell disease in bone marrow transplantation and pediatric orthopaedic ailments, such as the treatment of tumors, congenital hip dysplasia, congenital foot deformities, congenital clubfoot, congenital scoliosis, congenital prosthesis and musculoskeletal trauma. The orthopaedic hospitals in Chicago, Philadelphia and Sacramento, California provide spinal cord injury treatment.

The Shriners Hospitals that treat sickle cell disease for 11 years have a unique national network to help children with sickle cell disease to come to the United States for treatment, including day care, rehabilitation and organ services. Sickle cell patients with complications are referred to Shriners Hospitals for experience and knowledge of pediatric bone marrow transplants and bone marrow techniques to do so.

In 2005 Shriners Hospitals approved 37,755 new applications for care of 29,383 patients. In 2005 Shriners Hospitals for Children provided the following:

- ❖ 25,304 orthopaedic surgeries
- ❖ 5,745 orthopaedic follow-up and non-orthopaedic visits
- ❖ 17,734 orthopaedic and prosthetic fittings
- ❖ 2,012 surgical procedures
- ❖ 5,406 orthopaedic therapy treatments
- ❖ 17,857 congenital orthopaedic treatments

Shriners Hospitals for Children 2005's share of total \$66 million is designated to fund programs including sickle cell disease treatment, bone marrow transplantation, limb fitting and organ transplantation. During the 2005 year, Shriners Hospitals approximately \$70 billion has been spent to open Shriners Hospitals and over \$17 billion has been spent on construction and operation.

# Membership Report

Wa Wa has been challenged to create 42 new shriners and restore 14 members (restoration challenge meet). Campaign ends June 10th., 2006.

The answers to the above questions are unknown at this time. The answers to two of the questions will become known at the time of our June Ceremonial as the results of the hard work of each noble who signs a Petition for Initiation and Membership for a new member. The other question to answer is, "How many men will become masons and then shriners this year?" All shriners

are being asked to support their craft lodge particularly during the centenary anniversary of the Grand lodge of Saskatchewan. **Harmonious labours will afford the opportunity to introduce men into Masonry thus increasing their membership and hopefully, that of the Shrine.** Many men are awaiting the opportunity to become a mason and a shriner. Your dedication to Masonry and Shrinedom will, in this aspect, assist in reducing the average loss, during the past five years, of 55 shriners and 233 masons., to a positive growth for both organizations..

Petitions for Initiation and Membership are readily available from any Club's Membership Chairman, Club Liaison Officers, or Wa Wa Shrine Centre. All Petitions are to be submitted to our Recorder by May 10th., 2006 for processing for the June Ceremonial to be held in REGINA, June 9th and 10th., 2006.

**Membership is every Noble's responsibility.** The obtaining of new members, the retaining

of present members and the restoring of former members are all vital to maintaining and increasing our membership for which revised Incentive Plans are being considered. Based on the 2005 statistics and to fulfill your Membership Committee's objective of an "Annual increase of 1% in the net membership of Wa Wa Shrine Centre", a total of 60 new and restored members would be required, or an average of 4 members per club. Can we reach our Goal? YES WE CAN, then we will know how many new and restored shriners are required to show a positive growth in our membership.

So let's all do our part and "make membership click in 2006.

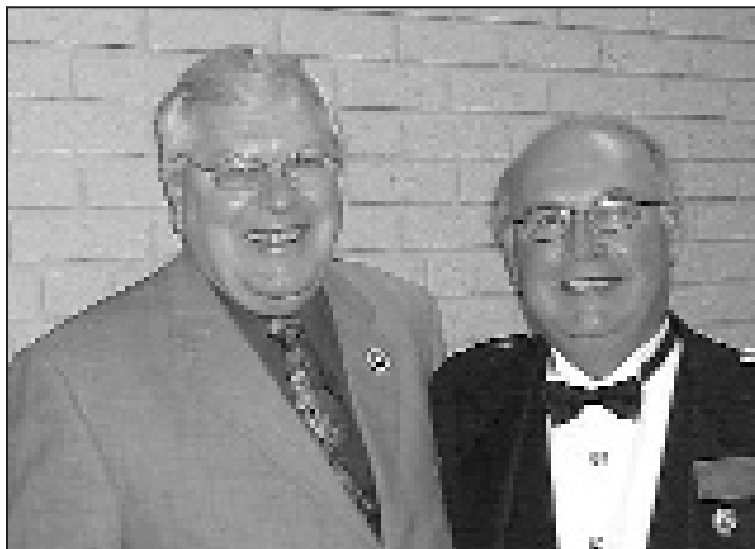
## Working Together

## “Magic of Giving” campaign is first for Shriners

Shriners Hospitals for Children has launched an advertising campaign of mystical proportions.

“The Magic of Giving” is the largest direct-response awareness campaign ever undertaken by the Shrine of North America and its philanthropy, Shriners Hospitals for Children. The effort marks the first time the organizations have purchased television time to promote the fraternity and philanthropy. In the past, they have utilized unpaid airtime reserved for public service announcements.

The campaign represents an effort to reach more families with children who need the pediatric orthopedic, burn and spinal cord injury care Shriners Hospitals provide, encourage donations for the hospitals’ operations, and highlight the Shrine fraternity.

“The Magic of Giving” project consists of a 30-minute television program supplemented by several 60-, 90- and 120-second commercial-like TV spots.

The host of the full-length program is magician Lance Burton, a long-time supporter of the Shrine and Shriners Hospitals. Portions of “The Magic of Giving” were taped in front of a live audience at Burton’s theatre in Las Vegas and feature some of his signature illusions. Other portions of the program were taped at the Salt Lake City Shriners Hospital and other sets specially designed for the project.

“The Magic of Giving” includes cameo appearances by celebrities Tony Danza, Dick Van Dyke, Ringo Starr, Sarah McLachlan and golfing legend Arnold Palmer. It also highlights several patient success stories.

The full-length program began airing in mid-December and will continue through the first quarter of 2006. Airtime was purchased on national and regional cable stations and primarily targets fringe and access time slots — as well as some overnights. The spot announcements will begin airing after the longer program has received broad exposure.

“The Magic of Giving” airs in the Chicago, Houston, St. Louis, Los Angeles and Tampa, Fla., markets on a regular basis for two years. It premiered on national cable television Christmas Day on CNBC. After two years of testing, the program’s success will be evaluated.

## Notice of Motion

The Recording will bring forward the following motions at our next Stated Session:

1. Motion: That Section 2.7 of Article 2 of the Bylaws of WaWa Shriners, 2006 read: "A member shall be suspended for non-payment of dues if his dues are one (1) year in arrears."
2. Motion: That the Bylaws of WaWa Shriners, 2006, as amended, be approved."

Explanation:

1. The temple pays up front the per capita dues of a member at the beginning of each year. Currently, a member of WaWa Shriners will be suspended for non-payment of dues after the second year. The temple has carried the per

capita dues, which is \$15.00 a year for two years for that member. If the Noble is suspended after two years, the Imperial Council returns the per capita dues for the year of the suspension. The Temple loses to Imperial Council the first year's per capita dues.

At a Divan meeting held on February 27, 2006, a motion was passed that a Noble will be suspended for non-payment of dues after one (1) year, effective January 1, 2007 and the bylaws be amended as such.

2. Imperial Council has required WaWa Shriners (and many other temples) to re-write our bylaws to conform to a "model" format. After many draft revisions by your Assistant Rabban, Richard Brown and the Recorder, and

consultation with the Chairman of Jurisprudence & Laws Committee, Warren Upton, the new bylaws are presented for approval by the Nobility of WaWa Shriners.

It should be noted, that although the format of the bylaws have changed, there is no change to our particular laws, policies or resolutions with the exception of the one above.

Upon approval, the new bylaws will be forwarded to Imperial Council for ratification to become law.

## Shriners Hospitals to develop national cleft lip and palate treatment program

About 5,000 children are born each year with deformities of the upper lip and mouth. The condition is uncommon, but it is devastating to those affected. Care for cleft lip and palate is often difficult to obtain and is at best, fragmented and incomplete.

No matter how many children are affected, they deserve the best medical attention available. Shriners Hospitals for Children, long known for its care of children with orthopedic, burn and spinal cord problems, is responding to this unmet medical need by adding it to our official disciplines.

At the November meeting, the Joint Boards approved development of a National Shriners Cleft Lip and Palate Program. A detailed proposal, outlining a plan for a systematically organized network of locations, staffing recommendations and costs will be presented to the boards in April 2006.

In addition, the budgets provided adequate funding for the cleft lip and palate program already in place at the Chicago Hospital, which will serve as a model for the future effort. "Step one was to ensure that the Chicago Hospital, which has achieved a national level of prominence in this field, has the resources to provide all necessary services," said Donald Lighter, MD, associate director of medical affairs for Shriners Hospitals. Step two will be to closely study the Chicago model and then determine how best to proceed with expanding the program to other hospitals, Lighter said.

### *A comprehensive program*

The Chicago hospital has about 1,700 active patients in its program. These patients account for at least 350 operative procedures and a minimum of 5,000 patient visits annually. Ancillary medical needs are provided through agreements with three major universities in the area.

Treating cleft and palate problems is a large-scale undertaking. Children require care from birth to adolescence, which fits well in the Shriners mission of providing family-centered care until the patient's 18th birthday. Several types of surgeries, including lip and palate repair, nasal reconstruction, breast work and dental procedures, may be required when treat-



ing these disorders. Even so, much of the work can be done on an outpatient basis and hospitalizations are typically short. Still, the children will need additional care and attention, such as speech therapy, psychological evaluations and orthodontic treatments. These children will also need the expertise of several different medical specialists, including surgeons, several types of dental specialists, speech and language pathologists, audiologists and psychologists. The designated Shriners Cleft Lip and Palate Centers of Excellence will provide all necessary care, coordinate all imaging and coordinating with local medical centers and universities.

It is hoped that the new program will be the model for guidelines, comprehensive multidisciplinary care for these children, as well as provide medical research on cleft lip and palate problems. Of course, Shriners Hospitals intends to offer the same state-of-the-art, high-



quality care in this effort as it does in its established programs for orthopedic, burn and spinal care.
