

LaBatte Named to Roster of East-West Shrine Game

University of Regina Rams third-year left guard Brendon LaBatte has been named to the roster of the West squad in the East-West Shrine Game, slated to be held on Jan. 19, 2008 at John O'Quinn Field at Robertson Stadium in Houston, Texas.

LaBatte, who stands 6-4 and weighs 325 lbs., started all 10 games for the Rams at left guard and was a critical part of the offensive line that helped the Rams average a Canada West-high 32.1 points per game this year. "It's a great reflection on our program and on how much our offensive line has progressed," Rams offensive coordinator Bernie Schmidt said. "This speaks well of Brendon and the work he's done to improve his athleticism and increase his speed and strength. He'll represent the Rams and the CIS very well down there."

The East-West Shrine Game is an annual post-season collegiate football all-star game. Every year since 1925, the game has been played to help raise money and awareness for Shriners Hospitals for Children, an international system of 22 pediatric specialty hospitals that provide care at no cost for children with orthopaedic conditions, burns, spinal cord injuries, and cleft lip and palate. To date, the game has helped raise more than \$15 million and informed millions of people about the mission of this extraordinary philanthropy.

The 82nd East-West Shrine Game in 2007 included 37 players who were selected in the NFL Draft this past April, while an additional 51 players were later signed as free agents.

Also representing the CIS on the West squad will be Saskatchewan defensive back Dylan Barker. The East squad will feature Laval linebacker Eric Maranda and Sherbrooke wide receiver Samuel Giguere.

LaBatte, who is draft-eligible for the CFL this year, will become the second U of R player to play in the Shrine Game. The first was slotback Jason Clermont, who played in the 2002 contest before becoming a high first-round selection in the CFL draft.





On Friday, December 21st, the Moose Jaw Shrine Club had a special guest of honour at their "Friday and Friends" gettogether. Moose Jaw native, Dylan Barker, was recently nominated to play in the East West Shrine Bowl in Houston, Texas. The 21 year old Barker, who had an outstanding fourth season with the University of Saskatchewan Huskies, will be only one of four Canadian players selected to play in the Shrine Bowl. This is a big opportunity for Barker as NFL scouts will be evaluating players during practices and the game. Barker said he is looking forward to the speed and intensity of the American game. ESPN will broadcast the game on January 19th, 2008. Dylan Barker is the oldest son of Moose Jaw dentist Dr. Mike

Barker and his wife Barb. Dylan attended Central Collegiate

and played football with the Cyclones.

The East West Shrine Bowl is the premier all-star game in America. Held every year since 1925, the game's purpose is to help raise public awareness of the 22 Shriners Hospi-

tals for Children located throughout North America. The Shriners Hospitals provide expert orthopedic and burn care at no cost to their patients. To date, the game has raised over \$14,000,000 for Shriners Hospitals and helped inform millions of people about the mission of this extraordinary philanthropy.

PUBLIC RELATIONS REPORT

WA WA Shriners

Our initial goals for 2007 were to create an enhanced awareness of the red Fez within the general public. We also wanted to reawaken in our members an appreciation for the history, traditions and pride in our accomplishments. To this end we express our deep appreciation to all Clubs and Units for the excellent job they have done this summer in representing all Shriners in local parades.

We continued to offer Shrine Awareness powerpoint presentations to Clubs upon their request. Each of the presentations was modified to reflect the work and situation in each Club. What we have discovered is that the presentations fostered a renewed interest in our present members and the general public. Each of the presentations has brought new members to Masonry and Shrine during the year. We have offered the presentation at nine clubs and two ceremonials during 2007.

This year we decided to approach Access 7 Communications with the idea of producing a half hour program on the Shrine. The initial meetings last February progressed to the point where we were able to provide enough material for five programs. We set about to combine local individuals and Imperial PR Department success stories about patients. We were able to move from production to broadcast in December of 2007. We are excited to report that the series has entered a period of reruns during January and February of this year. Access 7 has also offered the series to all of the Access 7 Community Channels in the province and we are attempting to have Shaw Cable pick up the series. Should this come about the series will then be shown in all areas of the province. We have duplicated the series on one DVD and today a copy is being given to each Club President. We hope that they will use the series at meetings and public functions to educate their members and general public.

We want to thank the Browns (Jenn Mike and Carter) for coming to Regina from Estevan for the taping. We would be remiss if we did not thank the Nobles who were "voluntold" for this project: Illustrious Sir Randy Ball, Most Worshipful Brother Francis Hester, Nobles Mel Douglas, Ken Eskdale, Brian Donbrook and Noble Bill Forrest. Being able to tell our story with a local flavour enhanced the meaning of our philanthropy to the viewer.


We have consulted with a couple of the clubs that have and will be submitting Shrine Information to their local newspapers. We feel that supporting the local initiative is more effective and cost efficient than trying to initiate a province wide print campaign. Based upon the results of a CTV Christmas Greetings campaign, tried in the southern Saskatchewan marketing last year, we expanded the program to be broadcast in both Saskatoon and Regina this year. For the voice-over we asked Bailey Abrey, a Shrine Kid, to help and she did a wonderful job. From the feedback this is a positive program for timely visibility.

We have set up a provincial media distribution system for disseminating Media Advisorys. These go out to print and electronic media in all of the communities served by WA WA Clubs.


We took part in the Leadership Seminars this fall when we were able to stress to the club leadership the importance of always considering public relations as it relates to each and every event. Taking Positive Steps: The Denny Family

The Denny family doesn't take things one day at a time.

"We take one minute at a time and enjoy every minute of every day like it's our last," Jim Denny said. "This is the way we live, and it's a good life."

Over the years, the Denny family of Oklahoma City has created and maintained a positive approach to life. Shaping that perspective, in part, was an experience so devastating that it forever changed the lives of the Denny family, and left a lasting impact on the entire nation.

On April 19, 1995, Jim Denny went about his morning routine of dropping his wife, Claudia, off at work and his two youngest children — 3-year-old Brandon and 2-year-old Rebecca — off at America's Kids, a daycare center located in the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building.

At 9:02 that morning, more than 5,000 pounds of explosives were detonated near the Murrah building in what was, at the time, the worst terrorist attack on U.S. soil. The explosives were in a rental truck, which was parked just outside the second-story windows of America's Kids. Nineteen of the 25 children there were killed.

Rebecca and Brandon were the only child siblings to survive. Rebecca sustained extensive injuries to her left side; and Brandon had massive injuries, including lifethreatening ones to his head and brain. Rebecca recovered after spending 10 days in the hospital. Brandon's condition was far worse.

In the weeks and months following the attack, Brandon had four major brain surgeries, each posing lifethreatening risks. After 126 days of hospitalization, Brandon was released, but his prognosis was not favorable.

Within eight months, Brandon was walking and talking, which doctors did not expect he'd be able to do. Because of the necessary removal of brain tissue, he had no use of his

right hand and his wrist was pointed downward. He also walked with a limp.

After years of therapy failed to produce tangible results, Brandon's Oklahoma City physician recommended the family seek treatment at Shriners Hospitals for Children — Shreveport. In the summer of 2007, Brandon, who was then 15, had several surgeries at the Shreveport Shriners Hospital to improve his gait (walking pattern), arm mobility and use of his fingers.

Brandon returned to the Shreveport hospital this past fall for a month-long session of intensive therapy, focusing primarily on eliminating the need for a walker. Upon completing his session, Brandon walked out of the hospital unassisted.

"We're at a place in Brandon's life where I couldn't be happier," Jim said. "This is a five-star facility without a doubt, from top to bottom. Everyone we've come in contact with has been super."

Having experienced firsthand one of the darkest days in American history, the Denny family savors each moment together and maintains a steadfast, positive focus on the future. While Brandon will always have orthopaedic issues related to his brain injuries, both he and Rebecca exude amazing perspective and determination. For Jim, it's the right view.

"It's a long road, and we've never asked for sympathy from anybody, but what we've received from people is understanding, a lot of prayers and a lot of help from good doctors," he said. "We feel we're in the best position at Shriners Hospital for Brandon to continue his efforts to walk better and use his fingers."

The family will continue their positive journey. One minute at a time.





GRAND MASTER'S MESSAGE CONT.





Now what about next year??? Suggestions for the Shrine Clubs for 2008:


- Appoint a Calendar Chairman now and submit his name to me and I will start working with him now for next year's program.
