

George A. Mitchell 2010-11 Imperial Potentate


During the 2010 Imperial Council Session, held in Toronto July 4-8, George A. Mitchell of Jordan Station, Ontario, Canada, was elected Imperial Potentate of Shriners International, making him the highest-ranking Shriner in the world. In this role, he serves as President of the Board of Directors for Shriners International and Chairman of the Board of Directors for Shriners Hospitals for Children®.

Mitchell is the president and owner of Mitchell's Bunsmaster Bakery and Deli and Maple Leaf Investments, and was involved in the motel business and real estate development for several years. He attended St. Catharine's Collegiate and Vocational School and majored in business at Niagara College. He is a member of St. Catharine's Business Club and a Kentucky Colonel of Niagara.

Mitchell served as Potentate of Rameses Shriners in 1997 and is a life-member of several Shriners clubs. He is an emeritus member of the Board of Governors of Shriners Hospitals for Children® — Erie and is a former Chairman of the Membership, Budget, Investment, Protocol, Insurance and Ritual committees. He has also served on the Special Purpose Funds/Fundraising Evaluation Committee and the Strategic Planning Committee.

His Masonic affiliations include Adanac Lodge #614, the Scottish Rite and York Rite bodies, Knights Templar, the Cabiri and the National Sojourners, Milwaukee Chapter #27. He is a Past Master of the Lodge of Perfection #616 and a member of Seymour York Rite College #185. Mitchell is also an honorary member of the Order of International Supreme Council of DeMolay International.

irst Lady Deanna Mitchell's fundraising program "Membership

– The Heartbeat of the Shrine," aims to increase the membership of
Shriners International.

Today, there are approximately 340,000 Shriners belonging to 193 temples around the world. Although the background and interests of Shriners are diverse, they are bound together by their commitment to family, personal growth and their philanthropy, Shriners Hospitals for Children®.

"Since the fraternity opened the doors of its first Shriners Hospitals for Children® in 1922, Shriners have contributed greatly to the health care system through their fundraising and volunteer efforts," First Lady Deanna said. "For that reason, I think expanding Shriners International is one of the most important things we can do for the children."

Proceeds from this yearlong initiative will be used to support new and ongoing efforts to recruit and retain members. An example of one such effort is beashrinernow.com, a Web site where interested men can learn about Freemasonry and Shriners International. The site includes an historical overview and information about the Shriners organization. It explains the connection between the fraternity and Shriners Hospitals for Children[®], and includes a tour of one of our hospitals, patient success stories and hospital locations.

Another Web-based effort designed to help existing members stay involved and interested in our organization is Shriners Village. The site is a new Web community created exclusively for Shriners. Fraternity members can visit www.shrinersvillage.com to read the latest news, features and events from Shriners International and Shriners Hospitals for Children®, watch videos and download education and temple-related business materials.

Other exciting efforts include the Membership Development Specialists (MDS) program, which consists of a team of 30 Shriners who have demonstrated talents for building relationships and promoting activity in Shriners International. Each specialist works with five or six temples to help them reach their individual membership goals.

As First Lady Deanna makes her visits throughout the Imperial Year, she asks that in lieu of personal gifts, nobles and ladies make a donation to "Membership – The Heartbeat of the Shrine." Shriners move ahead with Montreal hospital

CBC News—Shriners Hospitals for Children says it is moving forward with plans to replace its existing hospital in Montreal with a larger facility.

The \$100-million hospital will be built on two hectares next door to the Montreal Children's Hospital, part of the McGill University Health Centre in the city's west end.

It will replace the current hospital, an 85-year-old facility in dire need of repair on Cedar Avenue at the base of is going to be an amazing thing," Cinman said. Mount Royal.

Thursday's announcement came after a decade of delays, including a failed bid by the Ontario city of London in 2005 to move the facility there.

There were also allegations that the soil at the planned Montreal site was contaminated. Plans for expansion were also almost entirely derailed by last year's recession.

But Quebec "fought hard to ensure that the hospital stayed at home," the province's health minister, Yves Bolduc, said Thursday.

"The construction project ... is part of the investments we have made to upgrade our infrastructure in the health-care system," Bolduc added in a statement.

"We have known for some time that a new hospital was needed and we have focused our efforts on making this become a reality for our patients" said Gary Morrison, former chairman of the board at Shriners Hospitals for Children Canada.

Hospitals across N. America

Shriners officials said the new hospital, which will include 22 single-patient rooms, four operating rooms and more than 2,300 square metres of research space, is expected to be complete by 2014.

The Shriners, a Masonic fraternity based in Tampa, Fla., operate 22 hospitals, including 20 in the United States and one each in Canada and Mexico.

The hospitals specialize in pediatric orthopedics, burns, spinal cord injuries and cleft lip and palate. The Montreal facility is bilingual and provides elective pediatric orthopedic care.

Former patient Nathalie Cinman of Montreal, who suffers from osteogenesis imperfecta, or brittle bone disease, said she doesn't know "where [she] would be" without the Shriners hospital and welcomes the new facility.

"I maybe wouldn't be healthy enough to speak with you and I think that just eliminating waiting times for children

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A New Smile For Nikki



Born in China with a severe cleft lip and palate, Nikki was adopted into a loving family here in the U.S. Little did she know, there was a second family waiting: Nikki's new 'family' at Shriners Hospitals for Children®. We were waiting to give Nikki a brand new smile... and what a wonderful smile it turned out to be!

During the summer of 1996 in China, a baby girl was born with a cleft lip and palate. Meanwhile – some 6,000 miles away in Illinois – Al and Janet Gozzola were submitting adoption papers.

Nearly a full year passed before the call came that would connect these three lives forever.

"We left immediately for the [adoption] center," Janet says. "As soon as we arrived, we were shown pictures of our beautiful new daughter and quickly realized that she was born with a severe cleft lip and palate."

The Gozzolas knew there was a chance their baby might have a facial cleft. That was because they made clear on their application they had no problem accepting a child with this type of birth condition — one which is among the most common.

The advance notice gave Janet time to research care options before traveling to China to get Nikki. She looked into many of the hospitals that perform cleft lip and palate surgeries. But after speaking with Mary O'Gara, director of the cleft/craniofacial program at Shriners Hospitals for Children® — Chicago, Janet's mind was made up.

Shriners Hospitals for Children® provided the best medical treatment plan for their daughter for a number of reasons.

"Nikki was already over one year of age and had not had any corrective procedures done yet," Janet explains. "The multi-disciplinary approach of the cleft/craniofacial team outlined exactly what to do and they got to work immediately preparing her for the first surgery."

Typically, babies born with cleft lip and palate undergo

repair surgery when they are between two and four months old. And many will need eight or more operations – surgeries that must be precisely timed as they grow – right up through the age of 18.

So upon returning from China with their new baby girl, the Gozzolas' journey continued, with the cleft/ craniofacial team at Shriners Hospitals for Children® — Chicago. They hoped Nikki would quickly recover from her first surgery — a successful operation to repair her cleft lip and palate, and to

place ear tubes. Since then she has returned every six months for check-ups, and for an alveolar bone graft to correct her gum line.

Nikki's parents also hoped she would adjust well to the changes. And has she ever! After additional dentistry and tooth capping, Nikki now sports a full set of braces. "Her teeth are gorgeous!" says Janet. In her spare time Nikki can be found drawing, listening to music and spending time with family at their cottage in Wisconsin.

Mom Janet sums it all up, saying "I have comfort in knowing that Nikki will be cared for with compassion and respect for the remainder of our years with Shriners Hospitals for Children®. I know we chose the right hospital for Nikki."

2. Click on the "Donate Now" button (located in the left navigation bar or at the top of the page) to go to the secure online donation form. Choose a hospital you would like your donation to be credited to, or choose "Shriners Hospitals for Children" if you would like your donation to be used where it is most needed. Then, enter the amount you would like to donate. If you would like to donate that amount each month, click the "recurring gift" check box. Your gift will be automatically processed each month. You can change the details of your recurring gift at any time.

- 3. If you would like to make your gift in honor or memory of someone, check the box for honor/memorial donations, and fill out the requested information. You can choose to print a special certificate upon completing the donation process, or request that an acknowledgement of your gift be mailed on your behalf. If you don't want to make a tribute gift, simply click "next" to move on.







Thank you from the Brown's

Good evening! I am so honoured that Don asked me to speak here again tonight. It has been three years since I first told you about our son, Carter at the 2007 Ceremonial. He was only six months old at the time and there were so many unknowns for us. I looked back at some of the things I talked to you about that night and although it's clear we were on the right track with Carter's care, we were still very scared and unsure of what the future would hold for him.

In January of 2007 at three weeks of age, Carter was diagnosed with Osteogenesis Imperfecta, which we call OI and many others know as brittle bone disease. He had already suffered fourteen fractures in his arms, legs, ribs and vertebrae by that time. The outlook was pretty dim since he was presenting so severely and we were told he would have numerous fractures, extreme muscle weakness, loose joints, scoliosis, hearing loss, curved bones, brittle teeth, possible pulmonary issues and no chance of ever being able to walk. Many of the OI patients that are affected severely experience hundreds of fractures in their lifetime resulting in multiple deformities and pain, as we witnessed during Dr. Fassier's presentation last night.

We had been offered no hope of treatment here in Saskatchewan and were at a complete loss until we spoke to Noble Butch Maclean in Estevan. He knew of specific children with the same condition as Carter that had been treated in Montreal at the Shriner's Hospital and he was going to do everything he could to get us there as quickly as possible. The other patients were not as severe as Carter and had been diagnosed later in life, but we were still willing to try anything.

On that first trip to the hospital, Carter was seen by an amazing team of experts who knew exactly what they were dealing with. They started him on IV drug

treatments of pamidronate that were proven to increase bone density and rid the patient of the constant, achy bone pain that all people with OI experience. We hadn't thought they would start a 7 week old baby on any course of treatment, but it turns out that the best possible time to begin is when they are very young. We were told to return to the hospital every two months for Carter to receive treatment and to be followed by his team of doctors and therapists. The results of the infusion were almost immediate and Carter became a much more settled baby as soon as we got home after that first 3 day treatment. He started sleeping through the night because he was no longer in constant pain. We kept waiting for that next fracture to occur, but it never did.

We're still waiting for that next fracture 3 ½ years later. The constant fractures and pain that were supposed to be consuming his childhood have never happened because of the work of the Shriners Hospital. The treatment for children with OI was researched, developed, and tested in Montreal. It is the leading OI centre of excellence in the world and happens to be the place that our son gets his care. We have always felt so blessed that if our son is going to have this condition, he is going to get the absolute best care possible.

For those of you that aren't as familiar with the Shriners experience for a family that goes to the hospital, it is remarkable. Our flights and hotels are

booked for us and paid for by the Shriners, a Shriner is at the airport in Montreal to meet us and take us to our hotel, a Shriner picks us up in the hotel in the morning to take us to the hospital and then he will take us back to the hotel at the end of the day. It takes so much of the worry and planning off of the parent's shoulders when we already have so much to think about. Dr. Brian Donbrook does a wonderful job of keeping everything straight and dealing with my many emails as we get

each and every one of Carter's trips figured out.

On our nineteen trips to the hospital, Carter has received his IV infusions, physiotherapy, occupational therapy, specialist appointments, surgical appointments, play therapy, x-rays, bone density scans and a whole lot of love from every person who has ever seen him there. The Shriners Hospital has a team-centered approach to dealing with all of their OI patients. Once a year the entire team gets together in an OI conference and discusses how the patient has been doing and what the next year will bring. Everyone is on the same page they put together a cohesive plan to ensure that patient gets the best individualized care possible.

Carter's plans have included continuing his IV pamidronate infusions, an MRI on his dislocated hips and two different rodding surgeries. Often an OI patient's femurs are quite bowed or bent because of fractures that haven't healed correctly. They need to be straightened during surgery and a metal rod is inserted to provide internal stabilization. Carter had one femur that was quite bowed and he was also born with dislocated hips so that presented another problem. The MRI showed that he virtually had no hip sockets and that the tops of his femurs were in terrible shape and pointing in exactly the opposite direction that they should.

The incredible Dr. Fassier performed Carter's first surgery in November of 2008 just before Carter turned two. It was a very complicated six hour procedure. Dr. Fassier had been planning on fixing Carter's hips and rodding both of his femurs, but with the disaster that was his left hip, he only was able to complete one side before there was too much blood loss. There is absolutely no doubt in our minds that if anybody else had been doing that surgery, Carter's hip would never curve hasn't dramatically worsened, but have the function it does today. He challenged Dr. Fassier's skill and we are so thankful that he is such a fantastic surgeon. Besides fixing Carter's hip, Dr. Fassier straightened Carter's femur and inserted a Fassier-Duval telescoping rod, which he also happened to invent. The rod grows with Carter and will double itself in length, resulting in a much longer life for the rod and the protection it gives.

Carter was in a spica cast from his chest to his toes for 13 weeks to allow for sufficient time for his hip to heal. It healed beautifully and with the help of long leg braces that had been molded for him, he stood and took his first steps just a few weeks after getting his cast off. A large crowd of workers at the hospital gathered round to watch him do the impossible. Despite all of the challenges he had faced and a nearly irrepairable hip, he was walking. The hospital provided a walker for him and after that Carter has never slowed down. He got rid of the long leg braces a couple weeks after that and started taking many steps at a time with his walker. This past October. seven months after he had taken those very first steps, he threw the walker away and started walking all on his own. He is the most determined little boy with an unbreakable spirit and has proven the world wrong so many times. He grabs the hearts of everyone he meets with his beautiful smile and the buckets full of personality he was blessed with.

Things were going so well in the treatment of Carter's OI that we had started to forget how cruel of a condition it can be....until we noticed that his back was looking a little funny and got an appointment with the spine specialist in Montreal. Carter's spine already had a 50 degree curve in it and he was diagnosed with scoliosis. They molded him for a

back brace that he now wears 23hrs/day in the hope that it will slow the progression of the curve. We know that some day he will likely be having spinal surgery to have a rod placed in his spine and when he is older, he will probably have a spinal fusion. It is one of the hardest aspects of OI to deal with since there are so many complications that can occur. However, Carter tolerates his brace incredibly well and never complains. His the x-rays on our last trip did show that it had progressed a bit. Since we are now going to Montreal every four months for his infusions, they will be keeping a very close eye on it and we are hopeful that surgery won't need to happen for a few more years.

This past January, Carter had his other femur rodded and some minor repairs to that hip as well. He only needed to be casted for three weeks this time and he was up again walking independently a week after his cast came off. To see him walking as fast as he can into the open arms of Dr. Fassier, our hero, is truly one of the most incredible experiences of our lives. That man is the reason our son is walking and we will never be able to thank him or the hospital enough. Not only does Carter love him, it is clear that Dr. Fassier loves Carter right back! He is such a kind man who is so accessible to his patients. Just a few weeks ago, we did some post-op x-rays here at home to check on the healing in Carter's femur. We emailed the x-rays to Dr. Fassier, he checked them on his Blackberry wherever he was in the world...I think it was Europe this time...and he got right back to us to let us know everything was looking good.

In all my experiences, a child should never look forward to going to the hospital, but when Carter hears it's time to go to Montreal, he starts the countdown and just starts bouncing until he gets through those doors to see his friends. He knows everyone by name and they know him. He does think that he runs things there and last week he got about 6 people to come with him into the little room where his IV gets

started. He was directing them all into

singing happy birthday to one of the nurses and catering to his every whim....I'm not sure that every child has their nurse bring them a jar of homemade pasta sauce so we can make spaghetti in our hotel room that night. They are our family too!

The love that we feel every time we go to Montreal is only mirrored by that of the love we feel from the Shriners. Don is Carter's new best friend and if he goes missing tonight, we'll know exactly where he has gone. The various Shrine activities we've attended throughout the province have been so much fun and it's a joy to see the work you do. Carter may run off to join the circus one of these days as he had such a great time being honourary ringmaster. He also got his very first experience in a bouncy castle last weekend in Moose Jaw at the Children's Festival when Bevin gave him a few special minutes of time alone so he was safe and having the time of his life!

Three years ago, I told you that maybe, just maybe some day we would see Carter walk. We were filled with hope for the future because of the Shriners Hospital and the work you do to ensure that it is there for families like us. All of our dreams have come true in ways that we never even imagined at that time. This doesn't mean that we won't have more challenges in the future, but we know that we will be provided with the tools and help to overcome them. The care our son receives is second to none and that's all a parent can ask for. From the bottom of our hearts. we want to say thank you again for your support, your work, and your love. Thank you.

LEADERSHIP LOST BUT NOT FORGOTTEN

Les Tendler, a long-time Regina resident and a pioneer in the credit union movement, died July 24 at the age of 83.

As general manager of Sherwood Credit Union, now known as Conexus, Tendler was an integral part of laying the groundwork in 1973 for many financial services firsts in the province and Canada — including the first automated teller machine (ATM), the debit card and teleservice.

Ed Gebert started working with Tendler in 1951 when they were employed by the Saskatchewan Co-operative Credit Society. Over the years, they played major roles in a banking revolution.

Gebert was vice-president of finance and operations for Regina's Sherwood Credit Union and Tendler was CEO when Sherwood set out to develop an online banking system from scratch.

Sherwood worked with Co-operators Data Services Ltd. (now called CGI), Credit Union Electronic Transaction Services (CUETs), and Credit Union Central of Saskatchewan to create the ATM system. Canada's first ATM opened at Sherwood Credit Union's north Albert Street branch in the spring of 1977.

The next step in the evolution of electronic banking was the development of the MasterCard payment card — the forerunner of the debit card.

"Les was a great leader and a great mentor," Gebert said. "People had a lot of respect for him and he had a lot of respect for people."

Mal Edwards was vice-president of retail operations with Sherwood Credit Union during Tendler's era.

"When Les and I started back in the '50s, it was a very small organization, but they were exciting years," Edwards said. "As CEO, Tendler was the man who said, 'yes' or 'no' to all those changes ... As a people organization, we tried to develop systems that were leading in Canada at that time."


Until Tendler retired in 1988, he held numerous leadership roles within the credit union system.

"Les was an excellent leader, relatively quiet, always knowledgeable about things, people and events around him and he was a good family man," Edwards said. "He loved a good party and in those early days we were a very close-knit family. We worked hard and we played hard."

During his 40-year stint in the credit union movement, Tendler took a hand in Credit Union Central of Saskatchewan, the Coop Security Board, the Credit Union Deposit Guarantee Corp., the Canadian Co-op Society, CUETS, Co-op Trust, the World Council of Credit Unions, the Co-op Superannuation Society and The Co-operators group of companies.

The community-minded individual also belonged to many organizations including the Wascana Kiwanis Club, the Regina United Way, the Wa Wa Shrine, the Saskatchewan Roughriders Football Club, the Regina Exhibition Association, Group Medical Services, Luther College and Lutheran Seniors Care Home, the Canadian Liver Foundation, The Breakfast Club, the Tartan Seniors Curling Club, the Marian Park Condo Assoc., and the Regina Gyro Club.

A celebration of Tendler's life was held Friday at St. Mark's Evangelical Lutheran Church.



The loss of a great Shriner—Dr. Borden Bachynski

I am pleased to have been asked by the family to offer a few words concerning Borden's involvement in the Shrine. Borden became a member of the WA WA Shrine Center in 1971 under then Potentate Al McGowan. Almost immediately after having the red fez of a Shriner placed upon his head, Borden became a member of the Directors Staff. He served as President of the Unit in 1977. The Directors Staff has the responsibility of ushering new candidates through the Ceremony of Initiation. The first step a new candidate must take is to undergo a medical examination, and of course Borden being a doctor, had that responsibility fall on his shoulders. I am estimating Borden must have performed a minimum of at least 2500 medicals on new candidates over the years.

At all Shrine gatherings, Borden could always be seen taking pictures. I would not even begin to estimate the number of photos he has taken, but it is safe to say he kept the film industry in Saskatchewan solvent for many years. Thank goodness for the coming of the digital era. Many of these photos were placed in albums identified by the particular event they were taken at and in subsequent years, at similar events, these albums would be circulated and you could hear such remarks as "look, that fellow is wearing the same shirt again this year" or "heavens, I don't remember looking like that" - great memories!

The philanthropy of the Shrine is of course, Shriners Hospitals for Children. Children with debilitating orthopaedic conditions, painful burns and scars, spinal cord injuries, cleft lip and palate are all eligible for care at one of our hospitals. When an application for treatment at one of our Shriners Hospitals is received, that application was first reviewed by Illustrious Sir Doctor Borden Bachynski. Borden made the decision as to whether or not that child would benefit medically at one of our Shriners Hospitals. With a current active patient roster of some 75 children, Borden spent many hours studying and reviewing the child's medical history prior to recommending the application be referred to one of our hospitals. For the time and effort spent over the years, Borden has been recognized by Shriners Hospitals for Children.

Borden was selected to Divan in 1978 and advanced through the various offices of the Shrine to become the top Shriner in WA WA Shrine in 1987. I am proud to say Illustrious Sir Borden placed me on the Divan in 1987, the year he was Potentate.

Friday nights at the Regina Shrine Club, Borden and Margaret could always be found at their favorite table enjoying Happy Hour and of course Borden with his little sip of scotch. Borden's presence at this event will be missed, as he always had a photo or a joke to share with all assembled.

As we look back over the years, there is little doubt Borden has made a tremendous contribution to WA WA Shrine and the Shrine in general. On behalf of the entire Shrine family, let me express our sympathy to you Margaret and to your entire family on the passing of a dedicated Shriner, a great individual and a true friend to all. He will be missed - but not forgotten.


