

50 Flights with Dallas

Shrine Kid Dallas Carrier was born in March, 2015, to Jacqueline and Dustin Carrier of Neuanlage, after an uneventful pregnancy with 6 ultrasounds that showed no abnormalities. Their youngest daughter was born with arthrogryposis multiplex congenital (AMC), a condition which affects about 1 in every 3,000 live births. An estimated 20 to 30 percent of infants with AMC never make it past their first birthday. The condition causes multiple joints in the body to be stiff or fixed.

After 6 days in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit the diagnosis of AMC was established. Dallas had hyperextended locked knees, a small jaw, vertical talus, a partially closed left eyelid, flexed elbows, contracted tiny hands, and a hernia through the diaphragm muscle separating the chest from the abdomen. Initially Dallas went to our Montreal

hospital for weekly, and then biweekly, casting of her feet. Later she went to Shriners Hospitals for Children in Philadelphia.

Her father stated Dallas had been on 54 flights in 15 months, and that Shriners have helped generously with the family's travel costs as well as providing Dallas with all of her braces, splints, and an infant wheelchair called a ZipZac.

Friends and neighbours in the Hague area have also been very supportive, and along with the Hague Fire Department and local businesses, held a fundraiser so that the family could purchase some of Dallas' assistive devices, such as a miniature walker, costing \$2000.

While Jacky Carrier's workplace has been accommodating her so that she could take additional time off

to care for Dallas, along with accompanying her on many flights, it hasn't been an easy road for the family of five. Dallas' father stated that she had surgery to repair the diaphragm hernia in Saskatoon, with a great outcome, and that her eyelid had a sling installed, under the skin that connects to her forehead muscle, in Montreal. Dallas will be having a follow up visit in our Montreal hospital in September. We Shriners wish her well, and appreciated Dustin and Jacky coming to the Ceremonial in Prince Albert as our guests in June when Jacqueline addressed the audience.

STOP BURN INJURIES (SBI)


Before you leave the house, extinguish all the candles so they don't start a fire. That was the one of the main messages the WA WA Shriners of Saskatchewan gave to students at École St. Henry Jr. School on March 9, during a presentation about preventing burn injuries from everyday objects at home. Miller Elementary School students also heard the same message later that day.

Melville was the first stop for the Shriners in east-central Saskatchewan, explained Stop Burn Injury chairman, Ken Eskdale. Students in grades 2 to 5 living in Esterhazy, Langenburg, Theodore, Springside, Saltcoats and Churchbridge will also hear the same message during the next two months.

Grade 2 student, Matilda Schmidt hadn't seen Eskdale's presentation before, but she enjoyed hearing about fire safety and how not to get hurt. One thing she didn't know before was to put a cloth or blanket at the bottom of a door so smoke didn't enter a room. Schmidt also enjoyed the video featuring Bugs Bunny especially the message from Tweety Bird.

"He was talking about the hot tub in the bathroom", she said, that you should turn the cold water on first and then hot water on second.

Eskdale provided the students with tips about how to deal with a fire at home or at school. He also gave them two pieces of "homework", talking to their parents about having an escape plan and ensuring every candle is blown out before leaving the house. "When you go out, the candle goes out", Eskdale had the students repeat.

He reiterated throughout his presentation that candles can be dangerous and should be blown out, whether in the living room, bathroom, or bedroom.

The first thing to do if there is a fire is get out the building and call 911, Eskdale explained.

It is unadvised to go back, even if a family member or pet is still inside, he said. The students should inform the firemen that their mom or little Fluffy is still stuck inside. At school, students should follow their teacher out of the building and not their friends.

If there is smoke billowing through the building, students should get down on their hands and knees and crawl outside. Eskdale explained if students stand up and attempt to run, they will inhale smoke and collapse.





In checking doors before opening them Eskdale suggested students use the back of their hand, as it is more sensitive than the palm and can detect heat better.

If a pant leg ever caught on fire while escaping students should cover their faces and stop, drop and roll until the flame is out. Eskdale had a couple of students demonstrate this to their classmates getting them to roll on the floor much to the delight of the students.

Smoke detectors should be on every level of a home and batteries always left in, said Eskdale.

Every year the batteries should be checked to ensure they still work.

For people who live in buildings with two or more storeys, one of the first things to do if there is a fire is to put a blanket under the door to prevent smoke from entering a room. This will give the occupant time to attempt to get out.

If there is a window, it should be opened slowly so smoke from outside isn't sucked in. Students should yell out the window or wave a colourful blanket to get the firefighters' attention; having a rope ladder in the room would also be useful.

Eskdale then went over the possible items in home that could burn the students, starting in the kitchen and moving to the living room, bathroom, bedroom, garage and patio. He also discussed push and riding lawnmowers and being careful around campfires.

"No horseplay around the campfire," he warned.

A short video was played at the end featuring Bugs Bunny and friends informing students how they could get "burn proofed" and stay safe at home.

cake. Again, it is great publicity for the Shrine to be in attendance.


